News from Burton Overy Parish Council

Meeting 1st November 2010 in Village Hall – The village hall management committee, experiencing a shortfall in funding due to increased running/maintenance costs and falling revenue from fund raising events, requested a donation from the Parish Council. The Council agreed a donation of £250 in both the current and following year, saying it would do all it could to encourage village residents to support fund raising events in the hall.

The hall committee does a magnificent job in maintaining the hall in such a splendid condition and providing a venue which is the envy of many other villages in the county. The Council hopes that more residents will turn up at the regular fund raising events, such as the monthly quizzes run by Steve Kirk and ensure that the facility remains on a firm financial footing.

<u>Precept 2011/2012</u> – For the second year in succession the Parish Council precept has been set at £2500.

<u>Telephone Kiosk</u> – As reported in Minutes of previous meetings the Council has purchased the redundant telephone kiosk from BT for £1 and has sought the views of villagers on potential uses. A number of suggestions have been made, for which Councillors are most grateful, together with offers to paint the kiosk and do whatever work is required to put it to a new use for the village. A decision on its use will be made at the next meeting.

<u>Election of Parish Councillors</u> – In May 2011, elections will be held for the position of Parish Councillors. Villagers with an interest in standing for election should contact the Clerk to the Parish Council, Steve Kirk for further details.

<u>Parish Council and Planning Meetings</u> – Agendas and Minutes for meetings are posted on the Parish Notice Board. Councillors welcome the attendance of residents at these meetings. The next full meeting is on Monday 14th February 2011 at 8pm in the Village Hall
