#### **TEAM BOGG & BULB PLANTING**

Congratulations to the youngsters of Team BOGG and their leader Dave Fletcher on another successful year. At the Grand Challenge this September our 17 youngsters did very well. One of our junior teams was runner up in their class whilst one of our intermediate teams won in their class

As a fund raiser for Team BOGG another bulb planting in the village was held on Saturday 8th October to fill in a few gaps and complete the work of 2 years ago. The bulbs planted two years ago look excellent and our grateful thanks to all who helped plant up. About 4,500 daffodil bulbs, together with cyclamen and other flowers were put in. This time about 500 daffodil and narcissi bulbs and 100 cyclamen and grape hyacinth were planted.

The cost of the bulbs was paid for by the DCC, the PC, the VHC and the Flower Club.

The youngsters also called at all houses in the village between those times inviting donations of £1.00 per household for the planting. This money goes directly to Team BOGG funds.

# **NEWS ON THE CHURCH REPAIRS**

For those who are not aware, death watch beetle has been found in the roof timbers of the church. Death watch beetle is a serious problem.

#### **Richard Bloor** writes:

"The repairs to the Nave roof nave been completed. On starting work on the Chancel roof death watch beetle and bat nests have been exposed. Bats are a protected species. Our Architect has warned of more extensive work and cost than anticipated and is working on new estimates at the moment. It is proving difficult to get suitable contractors experienced in ancient buildings moving, because of commitments elsewhere, but we hope to have some firm estimates shortly"
