#### **BURTON OVERY PARISH COUNCIL**

#### **Wind Turbine**

The closing date for objections to the proposed erection of a wind turbine at Carlton Curlieu was set as 30th August 2012 and it is very pleasing for the Parish Council to note that some 70 letters of objection were received by Harborough District Council prior to that closing date. However, the date has now been extended to the end of September. If you have not registered your objection, or support, please do so at the earliest opportunity. The list of comments received to date can be viewed on the Harborough District Council's web site.

The Parish Council submitted a comprehensive objection; outlining the deficiencies which we noted in the application and sought to emphasise the particular beauty of this part of High Leicestershire and the incongruity of a wind turbine in this landscape. Additionally, we drew attention to the damage which we believe would be caused to the road network around Carlton Curlieu by the movement of enormous vehicles carrying the turbine blades and the numerous movements of heavy mixed concrete lorries. Finally, we outlined the areas where we think the granting of planning permission would be contrary to HDC's Core Strategy.

The planning application is scheduled to be presented to the HDC Planning Committee in October and we await the outcome with interest.

# **Dog Fouling**

Despite the Council's provision of bins for the collection of dog mess it is apparent that some dog owners are not clearing up after their animals. Dog excreta on pavements is particularly obnoxious and the Council will not hesitate to prosecute the irresponsible dog owners if there is sufficient evidence available.

## Party in the Park

There's an 1890's music hall song "After the Ball", which sold over 2 million sheet music copies in 1892 and was the first "platinum" piece of music. It depicts an uncle talking to his niece telling her why he is single, having lost his sweetheart at the summer ball.

No such melancholy in Burton Overy this year, as after the ball came the preparation for "The Party in the Park". Owing to the predicted rain deluge, marquees and gazebos were hastily erected to ensure that the street party could take place in the paddocks field, with many flags & decorations to give the whole week-end a festive atmosphere.

Sunday began with drizzle and then heavy reign, sorry rain, but this did not dampen the party spirit.

#### **Dog Show**

Sunday 3rd June, started with a dog show for about 20 dogs. Despite the weather, the dogs performed nearly as well as their owners, with some excellent acrobatics by the handlers if not the dogs. #### **Buffet Lunch**

#### Jubilee Oak, Church Service, Games and Beacon

The planting of the "Jubilee Oak", and children's games were postponed until the following day, when the weather was expected to improve.

The Sunday closed with a well attended evening church service at St Andrews.

Monday saw a little sunshine and a large crowd gathered on Washbrook Lane to plant the Jubilee Oak. This was sponsored by Stepping Stones, part of the County Council, who deliver and maintain green spaces in the county. Many villagers, including Floss Langton, our oldest resident, and village children placed a spade-full of soil into the hole, making a collective village planting. A plaque will be placed at the location shortly.

It was great fun with a number of amusing games, and all participants received a medal to commemorate their participation. Medals were also issued to those who could not be there on Monday, but had wanted to participate on the planned Sunday wash out.

The weekend closed with a large gathering at the Jubilee Beacon on Carlton Lane, expertly lit by Keith Holman at 22:15 to coincide with all other village beacons around the country, and culminating at 22:30 with the Queen's Beacon in London.

#### **BURTON OVERY CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL. 2012**

# A TRIBUTE TO A MORRIS DANCER FOR ALL TO ENJOY

# Potentillas planted at Bell Lane triangle

Morris dancing is a living English tradition, going back between 500 and 1000 years as far as records can tell us. There are two Morris men living in the Burton Overy village, who recently planted three Potentillas on the small triangle of land that is at the junction of Beadswell & Bell Lanes. This is to celebrate the life of one of the six founder members of the Leicester Morrismen, Cass Brailsford, who passed away recently. The site is particularly fitting, as this was recently discovered to be the last remaining part of an old village green.

The Leicester Morrismen were formed in 1956 by six dancers, (two of whom are still very much alive), who had moved to the county. The aim was to dance in the Leicestershire villages on a regular basis and take back the tradition to where it began. This they achieved to such an extent that they can proudly claim to have danced at some time in each and every county village, as well as various city locations, including Town Hall Square.

The Leicester Men are recognised as one of the finest "sides" in England, boasting three full sides of Dancers and Musicians, ranging from teenagers to octogenarians, demonstrating the "ongoing living tradition" of the Morris Men.

Morris Dancing is an excellent way of keeping fit and working up a thirst which they tend to quench at the village hostelries where they dance, providing not just the dancing but also providing amusing snatches of folk music songs and anecdotes, whilst taking the local Brew.

## **Death Watch Beetle Update**

From the outside it may appear as though little is being done in terms of repair work caused by the Death Watch Beetle. But please be assured work is going on behind the scenes - we are in the midst of the necessary preparation before labours can start in earnest.

In April we submitted our report to English Heritage to enable them to make their own assessment of the damage – and the likely cost of putting it right. Our report was accepted. This is excellent news because it increases the probability of a grant from English Heritage. They will be visiting St Andrews on 11<sup>th</sup> October to inspect the damage and to make their own estimates of how much the repair work should cost.

Following this visit we expect to hear in the new year if we will be offered an English Heritage grant and how much it will be. By spring 2013 we should have accurate estimates for the total costs involved and at that point we will know how much will have to be raised by the DCC.

The scaffolding currently in place on the East side of the church is not connected to the Death Watch Beetle repairs – but it is for phase II of the quinquenial repair work. The cost of this work is around £11,000 and funds are in place to pay for this work. Funds are not in place for the Death Watch Beetle works – but until we have a clearer idea of the figures involved we do not want to embark on the various fund raising initiatives we have in mind.

#### **MOLLY DURHAM**

Sadly last month saw the death of one of Burton Overy's oldest and longest serving residents, at the age of 91.

Molly Durham, was part of the village for so long and will be sadly missed. Her funeral was held at St. Andrew's church where she is interred.

Mary Barbour composed the following few lines in her memory:

Molly Durham passed peacefully away in her cottage in Oswins Row on 14th August 2012, aged 91.

Molly had lived in the village since she was 6 years old and as her nephew Eddie Burton, recalled at her funeral, change was not a thing Molly embraced, the nearest thing to it was when George Pears (formally the local butcher) gave her change for a ten bob note.

Molly was one of the few residents who never owned a car.
