## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

## **Roads and Drains**

As you will be aware the wet and stormy weather experienced over the last year or so has contributed to many potholes in the roads and a number of blocked drains. The worst effected area in this village is Scotland Lane. The County Council were made aware of some of the problems in Burton Overy particularly Scotland Lane many months ago. The County Council has a large backlog of notifications relating to potholes and blocked drains and priority has been given to areas where the greatest impact has been felt. I am pleased to say however that the necessary work is proposed in Scotland Lane early in May and blocked drains on Carlton Lane and on The Gravel will be attended to at the same time. With regard to the village as a whole I am informed that it is subject to a yearly inspection by the Highways Team and this is also scheduled for May.

## **Telephone Box Book Exchange**

This is now up and running as a book exchange. Thank you to all those who have contributed books so far. There is still space for a few more books and it would be good to have some for the children. Please feel free to add or borrow books as you like. I will try to keep the shelves in some sort of order but otherwise it will run on trust and goodwill.

In the summer months the box can also be used as a produce exchange for any fruit and veg from the garden that would otherwise go to waste. Again I will keep an eye on this as any produce placed in there will need to have a quick turnaround time.

## VILLAGE LEAFLET AND LOCAL MAGAZINE DISTRIBUTION

We all receive a number of communications on a regular basis. The Kibworth Chronicle, Glen Sence, Church and Village Hall flyers etc. It takes 3 hours to deliver to each property in the village and there are volunteers who have made this commitment for many years. Those volunteers are not getting any younger!

It has therefore been proposed that if we had 10 households (that includes teenagers!) who could take on an average of just 12 deliveries nobody would have to spent more than 20 minutes to deliver their share.

It would also be possible to coordinate the delivery of items which need to go out at the sane time thus avoiding duplicate treks around the village.

The Village Hall Committee will organise the breakdown of "rounds" so that anyone who needs to distribute anything will just have to drop of the correct number to each of the 10 volunteers.

## ST ANDREWS CHURCH

The church holds its AGM on 15<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Everyone is welcome. At that meeting we will elect churchwardens and DCC members and receive the annual accounts and other reports. At the AGM we will say thank you to 2 of our current DCC who have decided not to stand for re-election, namely Joan Stephens and Rebecca Broughton. Joan has served on the council for more than 20 years and Rebecca for more than 5 years. We are very grateful indeed to both Joan and Rebecca for all the leadership and commitment which they have shown to the work of the church. Each will continue to be involved on the various rotas as now and so we will not lose their valuable contribution, but we wish to record our gratitude to them both for their service to the Church Council. Two new candidates will be standing for election to the DCC. They are Steve Rankine of Corner Thatch and Anne Warwick of Linden.

During the interregnum we have been well served by a series of very good visiting priests. We are pleased to report that the Area Synod is recommending to the Bishop that we retain a full post in this Benefice. Their original intention had been to recommend a half post but they have been persuaded to change their proposal. If the Bishop endorses this proposal, as expected, we can advertise immediately for a replacement. The new vicar would be mainly concerned to build up St Cuthbert's and would spend 90% of his/her time there. We however would have all our services led as before. We have also committed to work more closely with the Oadby Churches with a view to our new vicar becoming part of a team ministry with the vicars in Oadby in due course.

We would like to thank the many people who offer their time and energy to help with the life of the church. From winding the clock each week, and the opening and closing of the church each day to the manning of the church rotas, musicians and vocalists, and to those who help provide lunches, refreshments and flowers. Not forgetting those who help by cleaning the inside of the church and keeping the churchyard tidy. We thank you all for your continuing support.

The annual visits from Launde School in inner-city Leicester to Craig and Nicola's farm were another huge success this spring. A small child was heard to say to one of the teachers 'Can we do this again tomorrow!' Our harvest collection which finances the transport for these trips is well spent.

#### **Church Repairs**

The extensive repairs to the Church roof commenced in early April and are likely to be completed by the end of July. The organ has been encased so that dust will not get in to the pipes and we shall be reliant on the electronic keyboard until the work is completed.

The commencing work will be the erection of extensive scaffolding both outside and inside the church and roof covering. The scaffolding will be alarmed. The Chancel and Lady Chapel will be curtained off. Services will continue in the Church with a nave altar. The church will be locked except during hours when the contractors are there and times of services.

Once again, grateful thanks to so many who have given so generously to enable these repairs to proceed.

### Church Break in (or break out!)

Recently one of the windows next to the South Porch was smashed and seriously damaged. Some of the food left for the institutions for the homeless was eaten and a mess made in Church. The Police are investigating and say the fingerprints indicate that someone did the damage while trying to get out of the Church. This would tie in with the fact that the Church is locked overnight and it would appear that whoever is responsible went into the Church while it was unlocked and was then locked in overnight.

The police are continuing their investigations and any one who sees anything suspicious around the church is asked to notify one of the Churchwardens. Fortunately we are insured for the damage to the window but there is a £500 excess.

## BURTON OVERY WORLD WAR ONE COMMEMORATION EVENT

#### AUGUST 3rd 2014

Plans are continuing to mark the 100th anniversary of the commencement of World War 1 and how it affected Burton Overy. Much research is being undertaken to try to find out more about the 8 men from the village who gave their lives between 1914 and 1918 so that their stories can be shared at the commemoration service which is being held in St Andrews Church at 3pm on Sunday August 3rd 2014. The service will be a chance to reflect on the events of a hundred years ago and hear some WW1 poetry, and also to join in with the singing of community WW1 songs. The service will be followed by an afternoon tea in the village hall with a different focus on the war.

To mark the fallen 8 villagers, there will be 8 sites around the village planted with poppies which will hopefully be in bloom for the event.

Burton Overy Parish Council have very kindly supported this event and more details will be available shortly.

CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

The 2013 Christmas Tree Festival, our 14<sup>th</sup>, was a resounding success, achieving a total profit of £9,200, an increase of more than £400 on last year.

£2,000 of the amount went to the Village Hall, the remainder to St Andrew's Church.

The organising committee are, as always, hugely grateful to everyone who helped to make the event so successful and so enjoyable. There were 57 tree entries. Visitor numbers were approximately the same as last year (4,363), and the trees received a total of 2,182 votes. Winners in the adult section were:

The layout of the trees and decoration of the church was masterminded by Judy Rollin, whose imaginative use of the scaffolding erected to deal with the Death Watch Beetle, produced a Bethlehem crib scene, complete with a star overhead, and was much admired.

Congratulations to all winners and thanks to everyone who entered and helped to maintain the very high standard – visitors often comment on the imagination, ingenuity and decorative skills of the display.
