Parish Council

Street Lighting Update

The Parish Council is continuing to seek a solution to the on going cost of maintaining the 25 village street lights. Advice has been taken including a meeting with Leicestershire County Council. The cost of electricity is running at about £1,000 per annum. Some of the lights are starting to fail due to age and the County Council has advised that a number of the light fittings are not up to current standards. Added to this the type of bulbs currently used in the lamps are becoming more expensive and within three/four years will be difficult or impossible to obtain at all.

Consideration has been given to having some lights permanently disconnected but this in itself is an expensive business and in respect of some of the column lights would actually cost more per light than having LED replacements.

If we are to retain street lights we will have to convert to LEDs over the next few years. Because of cost this will have to be a phased approach. As I have indicated in previous communications LEDs are expensive currently £280 per lamp and we will have extra expense with the light fittings on telegraph posts which are not currently suitable to take the weight of LED fittings.

There are a number of lights out at the moment. In respect of these I have now asked the County Council to quote for the fitting of three LED lights with the remainder being fitted with the standard bulbs. Depending on any issues with the brackets the three LEDs will be fitted on the failed lights on the main roads leading into the village. LCC have advised that these strategic lights remind motorists that they are entering a 30 mph limit. The LEDs last for 20 years and come with a guarantee.

The precept, the money the Parish Council receives through the Council Tax was increased again this year in part to help fund a phased conversion of the street lights to LEDs. The budget and therefore the precept will need to accommodate this process over the next few years. The County Council have indicated that once the lights are brought up to standard with LEDs they would be prepared to adopt them thus relieving the Parish Council of the running and up keep.

We are keeping open the possibility of disconnecting some of the overhead fed lights on telegraph posts. These will need extra money spent to enable them to take LEDs and the cost of disconnecting these is less than the cost of the LEDs. We would like to consult further with the village on this however and there will be an opportunity to do this at the next public consultation event which is to be arranged in respect of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Burton Overy Village Defibrillator

The village defibrillator is now up and running and available for use if needed. A big thank you to everyone who bought a defibrillator lottery ticket and congratulations go to Kate Marshall of Higher House, who won the lottery!

The defibrillator is located to the right hand side of the village hall, clearly marked with a sign on the wall. The unit is unlocked and is readily accessible day or night. Have a look and familiarize yourselves with its location.

There are a number of persons trained to conduct CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and defibrillator use but it is important to know that you do not need to be trained to use a defibrillator – it is an automatic system that quite literally talks you through what to do.

The list of trained persons with their location is with the defibrillator and shown on the following page. Please retain in case of an emergency.

Should you be in a situation requiring urgent first aid and the defibrillator, there are some basic steps to take:

Check for any danger to yourself or others;

Call 999 - the ambulance service will talk to you and provide immediate support. They are aware of our defibrillator and its location.

More important than the defibrillator at this stage is the provision of CPR – this can keep a patient alive by ensuring oxygen from chest compressions can reach the brain and heart whilst an ambulance and trained person travels to you;

Ensure a trained person is called to come straight to you to help;

Call for help from someone who can fetch the defibrillator – this may or may not be the trained person depending on location - their focus will be on helping the patient;

A trained person, once informed, will assist by ensuring CPR and operating the defibrillator; but as stated above, you will be able to operate it if needed with no risk of causing harm. Don't forget the 999 Operator is there to assist too.

Burton Overy Dancers

Since the last edition of the Newsletter, in addition to our regular Wednesday evening club night programme, *Burton Overy Dancers* has held a number of successful public dances. These have included a *Bonfire Night Barn Dance* (on November 5th!), a *New Year Tea Dance* in early January, and the club's *30th Annual Dance* in early March. The latter event was complete with a *30th Anniversary Cake* that was cut by three of the club's founding members; Margaret and John Pollard from the village, and Bronwyn Taylor from Houghton-on-the-Hill. All three dances featured live music from talented bands with Callers of national or international recognition who put the dancers through their paces! Each time the Village Hall was filled to capacity with over 60 people dancing to exhilarating tunes; they came from Burton Overy and local villages, Leicester and further afield.

As is customary, the club entered a tree in the **Burton Overy Christmas Tree Festival**; our theme this year was based on the 18th century folk dance "In the Fields in Frost and Snow" that was first published in 1710 in the Second volume of the Dancing Master, First Edition by John Young of London. The accompanying lyrics, printed by Thomas D'Urfey in 1719, are the song of a swain relating how he has to tend the animals on his father's farm during the cold winter months; it is generally considered to be the ancestor of the popular children's song "Old MacDonald had a Farm" because each verse features the sounds of the various animals! Out thanks go to club members Carole, Heather, and her daughter Alisoun, for decorating the tree with pictures of club members parading in single file as featured in the dance.

Another notable event was the *BOD Christmas Party* dance in December, when the band "*Kurly Kale*" not only played brilliant music but also performed folk songs and gave a demonstration of traditional clog dancing - all-in-all a thoroughly memorable and enjoyable night. Also, in December a group of *BOD* members gave a demonstration of two modern dances, "*Rosa Centifolia*" and "*Timoleigh Triangle*", at the Leicestershire & Rutland District *Annual Christmas Mix Dance*, when dancers from all the clubs in the district meet together for an afternoon of social dancing.

Our dancing continues on Wednesday evenings until June 21st, when we shall break for our summer recess and resume dancing again on September 6th. We have a busy programme planned which includes *Maypole dancing* on May 17, and a *Summer Party* on June 21. We are always pleased to welcome visitors and new members who would like to take up this fun activity. Club members will teach you the moves, ensure you are included in the dances, and generally make you feel welcome - so why not come along and give it a try?

One future date for your diaries - on Saturday October 28th, we shall be holding another *BOD Barn Dance* with club Callers, Ken Judd and Richard Spendlove, and the live band *Pandemonium* to provide the music.
