# Dogs

We have had some recent complaints from residents regarding dog waste on pavements around the village. Dog mess is a hazard to people and livestock. It is an offence not to pick up after your dog (this includes on all land to which the public have access and covers footpaths over fields). Owners can also be fined if they cannot produce a means to collect the waste when asked by an officer of HDC. We have three dog waste bins in the village but dog mess can be disposed of in any waste bin including your black wheelie bin. Dog owners please be considerate and clean it up.

Our fields are full of sheep and lambs and as the weather improves more livestock will be out in the fields. **TAKE THE LEAD** and keep your dogs under control around livestock. Go to www.nfuonline.com/BackBritishFarming for more information and advice.

### **Neighbourhood Plan**

The Burton Overy Neighbourhood Plan when made will form part of the basis for planning decisions applicable to Burton Overy Parish up to 2031. The plan sets out a vision and planning policy that aims to help shape future development in Burton Overy. The plan focuses on planning issues which consultation shows matter most to this community. These include policies that:

- Ensure that housing development takes place in the most sustainable locations, is of the right quantity and type and does not harm the existing and historic character of the village;
- Encourage the right types of development that meet local needs;
- Protect important buildings and structures of historic and architectural interest;
- Protect community facilities;
- Promote high quality design in new development which enhances the Parish's special character and identity;
- Protect the countryside and special landscape and where possible improve biodiversity and important habitats; and
- Protect open spaces that are important to the community and/or wildlife

The Neighbourhood Plan has now been submitted to Harborough District for the next phase in the statutory consultation process. All residents will have received a leaflet advising of this consultation stage which runs from 18 April to 20 May 2018. The plan and supporting documentation can be viewed on the Parish Council website (details above). #### **Trees and Tree Warden**

Tree wardens are a national force of local volunteer tree champions and a key part of The Tree Council's Community Action Programme. The Tree Warden Scheme gives people who feel that trees matter an opportunity amongst other things to:

- Champion their local trees and woods
- Plant and care for trees
- Survey Trees
- Provide early warning of threats, disease, decay or vandalism
- Get together with like-minded people for training and field trips
- Champion Tree Council initiatives such as its Hedge Tree Campaign to reverse the decline of trees and hedges

Tree Wardens also have access to trees at reduced costs and sometimes at no cost, at certain times of the year.

I am pleased to say that the Parish Council has now appointed Neil Phillips to the role of tree warden for Burton Overy. Neil has 18 years of experience as the Tree Warden for Great Glen and we look forward to working with Neil.

Burton Overy village is a Conservation Area and this designation recognises that the character of the area is worthy of preserving and enhancing. With regard to trees this means anyone proposing to cut down or carry out work to trees (excluding trees with a diameter not exceeding 75mm) is required to give Harborough District Council (HDC) six weeks prior notice. HDC can either make a Tree Preservation Order to preserve the tree or allow the work to go ahead. HDC is not able to make conditions such as requiring the planting of a replacement tree. We are keen however to encourage residents to replant a suitable tree in an appropriate location in place of one that is felled thereby helping to maintain the biodiversity and landscaping which is so important to our Parish. So please give this some thought when removing a diseased or problem tree.

#### **Parish Council Notice Board**

This has been located on the wall of Wheatridge, Main Street by kind permission of Larry and Myra Lambert for a number of years but we are now looking for a new home for it. The notice board contains all the information the Parish Council is by law obliged to display in a public place. It is glass fronted, is kept locked and measures 1000mm wide by 800mm high. It has recently been renovated and many thanks to Nick Jones for attending to that. If any one has any ideas as to where it may be placed and/or is willing to offer a wall to host it, we would be delighted to hear from you. Please give me a call on 259 3184. # **Burton Overy Village Hall**

All events since the last Newsletter - quizzes, the Christmas Lunch and the Christmas Tree Festival have been successful. The Village Hall share of the Festival profits was £2,500.

Currently, the Village Hall Management Committee's main preoccupation is with maintenance of the building: 18 years on, as with any building, repairs and renovation are now badly needed.

The recent re-vamp of the entrance to the Hall is a huge improvement and it will look even more welcoming when the remaining small garden area is planted with shrubs and low maintenance items. The cost of the alterations, a little over £13,000, has been met mainly thanks to a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund of £10,000.

Attention will now focus on new flooring in the Brian Pollard Room, replacement of the windows, which are rotting, and re-decoration of the room.

In the Main Hall, the toilets need refurbishment and adjustments to the overflow, plus redecoration .

Owing to constant use, in particular during the Christmas Tree Festival, the Hall floor, needs to be re-surfaced every seven or eight years and the work is now due. Hopefully, profits from the Three Peaks Walk in June will make a substantial contribution to the cost, estimated at £4,000.We are grateful to Robert Brown for this initiative.

The canopy in the Main Hall, generously provided by Jonathan Vaughan when the Hall was re-built, needs to be either cleaned and repaired, or replaced, a major undertaking, likely to cost at least £1,500.

Coming events are The Old Time Music Hall, on June 23, which is already a sell out, autumn quizzes, the Village Show, on 1 September, and the Christmas Tree Festival, 30 November – 2 December.

In order to conform with recent data protection laws we need confirmation from you that you are happy for us to continue emailing you from the Village Hall with information and details of events.

The Hall currently has a full quota of committee members but we are always looking for volunteers to be involved in various activities throughout the year.

We need outside bookings too, so whenever you have the opportunity, please mention the Hall as a venue for events – we work hard to keep it in tip top condition to provide an asset the village can be proud of.
